Lawton M. Patten was chairman of A Conference on the Acquisition, Care and Use of Historical Buildings and Sites, held at the University of Iowa, Ames, Sept. 23-24. 220 people from Iowa, Nebraska, Illinois and Kansas attended. Planned by the Dept. of Architecture of the College of Engineering with the Engineering Extension of the Iowa State University, it was co-sponsored by the Iowa Soc. for the Pres. of Historic Landmarks, the State Hist. Soc. of Iowa, the Iowa Conservation Commission and the Walden Fund of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Speakers included Richard S. Hagen on "Midwest Facades"; Charles van Ravenswaay on 19th C. midwest Furniture & Utensils; Holman J. Swinney, "Building Tools and Implements of the Pioneer" supplemented by Prof. Lawton's collection of early housewright & carpenter's tools. William Murtagh of the National Trust spoke at the dinner mtg. Next day, Roger T. Grange, Jr., Nebraska, State Hist. Soc. described "Preservation and Interpretation of Fort Robinson" and W. Howard Adams, Pres. Jackson Co. Hist. Soc. of Independence, Mo. told of the successful campaign to save the old Jackson County Jail. Dwight Kirsch arranged an exhibit of ptgs. & photos of Iowa sites and monuments. This was so well received that it is hoped that there will be another similar conference.
