Adewuyi, Olorunfemi. "Waste Streams across Lagos". *The Architectural Review*. May 2025.p.110-114.

"Lagos has a State Waste Management Authority, but it is fraught with politicking and inefficient in managing the city's complex waste cycle. In the absence of intelligent state strategies, it falls on people to engineer solutions. They add armatures, build networks and modulate the static thresholds and borders imposed by the state. Today,

these techniques and intelligence, born out of scarcity, are collectively labelled 'informality', a term that flattens their ingenuity." (111).

"During the course, we were given a project area to survey, and I started doing slope calculations and plant inventories. Meanwhile, the instructor got down on his hands and knees and waited. He started with 2 minutes of silence and then just observed, imagining himself as a drop of water and how he'd interact with all other beings, such as soil, vegetation, animals, and bacteria. He introduced himself to all the beings and told them what was going on, humbly asking for permission to attend. I suddenly realized I had never asked the land for permission to do anything!" (7).

"It is fabulous that some firms can provide post-construction maintenance, but that is clearly not an option across the profession. Meadows are promoted as resilient options for large open spaces, but little is mentioned of the costs associated with ongoing maintenance for staff time and numbers. We spend considerable funds each year to have an NGO partner keep the invasives and trees at bay on our warm-season native grass meadow." (12).

MICA Architects. "Woodland Quad". *The Architects' Journal*. May 2025.p.10-21.

"Wellington College is one of the world's top co-educational independent day and boarding schools with over 1,100 pupils. MICA was appointed to design a new 70-bed sixth form boarding house, a replacement day house and an energy centre as part of the school's wider estates masterplan in support of a range of academic, co-curricular and pastoral objectives. This included the creation of a new character area, which sits within a large woodland clearing close to the historic main college." (12).

Minutillo, Josephine, Matt Hickman. "Ricardo Scofidio (1935-2025)". *Architectural Record*. 2025.p.35-36.

"Beginning in 1981, the firm, then known as Diller + Scofidio, operated at the intersection of architecture, the performing arts, and the visual arts. During the first two decades, the partners realized a series of small, conceptual, but highly influential projects-

installation pieces, multimedia theater work, exhibitions, interiors, and unbuilt structures-including, in 1991, the traveling installation Tourisms: suitCase Studies and the groundbreaking residence Slow House, for an art collector (despite also literally breaking ground, the project came to an abrupt halt misconstruction with the sudden collapse of the art market, leaving its cornucopia-shaped foundations in the earth)."(35).

O'Connell, Kim. "Preservation". *Landscape Architecture Magazine*. Vol 115, June 2025. p.30-37.

"For decades, there was no public acknowledgment of the site's history outside the Black community "exactly the way to tell a story so that no one will hear it," as the author Kristen Green puts it in her book The Devil's Half Acre. "I'm from Richmond," says Jeannie Welliver, the city's project manager for the Shockoe Project, "and [in school] I never read one thing about enslaved people, slave auctions, the numbers, the economic engine that it was." Pedro and Juana. "Venice Architecture Biennale 2025." Wallpaper, May 2025.p.165-180.

"You might expect a business called Pedro & Juana to be named for its respective partners, but the dynamic, Mexico City-based architecture and design practice is, in fact, led by co-directors Ana Paula Ruiz Galindo and Mecky Reuss. They explain that their choice of studio name had more to do with ideas of authorship and the nature of architecture practice than any literal representation. 'Who is producing the work? Is there such a thing as an author, or is it rather about editors or directors? How do these hierarchies function? We consider ourselves architects, but we've also worked within the art world in places that were transdisciplinary in their make-up, so when we set up our studio, we wanted to keep this freedom. Pedro and Juana are common names in Mexico so, in a way, it leaves the idea of authorship kind of open." (171).

Reding, Benjamin. "Kunst Im Nichts". AIT. May 2025. p.52-53.

"Why this artistic scream into the void? "Do you know anyone at the Berliner Verkehrsbetriebe?" A fellow student asked me, a decade later, shortly before her graduation film at the art academy. "One scene is set in 1928 in Berlin in the entrance of a subway station. They still have an original station like that in Berlin, with a large entrance hall, that's where I want to shoot it! It's called Wittenbergplatz. In the scene, my main character says goodbye to his film girlfriend and goes into the hall. The scene will take no longer than two or three minutes." I mumbled, "Got it," and emailed and phoned around,

first with the BVG, then the public order office, then with the shop owners, the city cleaning department, the district mayor, with more and more offices and authorities." (52).

SO-IL. "Art Campus in New York". Detail. May 2025. p.43-49.

"Aman! is a not-for-profit center for contemporary art in Brooklyn's East Williamsburg neighborhood. It hosts exhibi-tions, events, publications, and guest residencies of local and international artists. It thereby fosters innovative creative formats and ideas while offering room for a dialogue with civil society. Amant opened the Art Campus, divided into two parts by Maujer Street, in a former industrial zone that is transforming into a residential district. This circumstance appears dis-advantageous at first glance. However, it actually offers various potentials, particularly when it comes to allowing users and visitors to experience the campus as an open and inviting institution." (44).

Satish Jassal Architects. "Edith Road". *The Architects' Journal*. May 2025.p. 34-47.

"Edith Road is a new build, net zero in operation, social rent housing development of eight council homes in the London Borough of Haringey, which completed in March. Designed by Satish Jassal Architects and developed in-house by Haringey Council, the project is an exemplar for how councils can deliver sustainable, affordable, high-quality homes for local families at social rents on tricky infill sites. Located on a former car park site that had lain unused for 15 years and adjacent to a modernist council housing estate, the development transforms underutilized urban land into a residential community." "On a sunny spring morning in south London, Walworth Square offers a freshly minted moment of respite from the clamorous main road. Around a peculiar new war memorial (to which war? The track suited boy perched on a branch is not enlightening) new trees shiver in the breeze, while, beneath them, a man, seemingly the worse for wear, stares vacantly at his scruffy shoes. Another man with enormous should re-emerges from a gym and begins to take selfies." (52).

"There is something magical about spending time engulfed in nature, among woods and birdsong. In Seogwipo, on the southwest side of South Korea's Jeju Island,

The compact structures are part of Egattoc, a hospitality complex designed for those seeking a quiet retreat immersed in the island's natural environment, The cabins' expansive glazing allows natural light in and maximizes vista of surrounding forest.
