# Selections:

Bui, Yen, "A School in the Wood". Architecture Today. Issue 465, 2025.p.126-131.

"Bound by a ten-year lease, the architects came up with a temporary and costeffective project, where each element reflects a deep respect for the environment and a desire to create an 'educational ecosystem' thanks to the 'living walls' that encircle each unit. Made up of a lightweight wooden structure and polycarbonate panels, filled with earth from site excavations and sediments collected from the surrounding forest, these walls evolve over time into a natural habitat that is made visible, transforming the classrooms into biodiversity observation laboratories." EAA (Arolat, Emre), "Sancaklar Mosque". Space. Issue 691, June 2025.p.30-35.

"Sancaklar Mosque located in Buyiikcekmece, a suburban neighborhood in the outskirts of Istanbul, aims to address the issues faced when designing a mosque by distancing itself from current architectural discussions on form and placing its focus solely on the essence of religious space. The project site is located in a prairie landscape that is separated from the surrounding suburban gated communities by a busy street. The high walls surrounding the Jark on the upper courtyard of the mosque depict a clear boundary between the chaotic outer world and the serene atmosphere of the public park. The long canopy stretching out from the park becomes the only architectural element visible from the outside." (31)

"After its launch- made possible by an MIT incubator and funding from various sources- the project won a grant from the City of Paris that has allowed its implementation. "We want to propose it on other buildings in the city," concludes Faber. "We are al-ready in contact with public bodies, private groups and a number of blocks of flats that are interested in this 'green reconquest' of roofs." As well as creating oases of coolness, in fact, Roofscapes' platforms allow the creation of new common spaces." (76)

Montenegro, Munoz, Pina y Rodriguez. "Expo Osaka: Amid the Icon and the Everyday". *Arquitectura Viva.* Issue 274, 2025.p.24-29.

"Inaugurated last 13 April, the World Expo of 2025 is being held on the artificial island of Yumeshima, 'Island of Dreams,' a tract re-claimed from the sea on Osaka Bay that until recently was an infrastructural void, one which appeared in the 1980s as part of the Techno port Osaka plan, a symbol of Japan's metropolitan expansion in the second half of the 20th century. The transformation of this piece of land into the venue of an international event marks a decisive moment as much for local urbanism as for the global discourse on ephemeral architecture and the resignifica-tion of obsolete industrial environments." "The experiment in social housing carried out by Infonavit on the edges of the small Mexican city of Apan, in the state of Hidalgo, marks a change in direction in the history of the low-cost residential districts of which there are so many celebrated examples in Latin America. Distancing itself from the social-democratic program of PREVI or Elemental's efforts to impose order, it proposes a new urban model built on the relationship between heterogeneous architectural figures, a sort of disassembled housing that produces the impression of order in disorder." "So, we could ask ourselves if it might not be worth de-veloping the dualism present in our cities in a dialecti-cal sense, without carrying on with the effort to prefig-ure a unitary utopia and without seeing the extension of a despotic rational order as an objective of urban re-generation. On many sides people are already reconsidering the conditions that best represent the situations of association, exchange, etc., suited to the complexity of a city, at the cost of taking a few more risks, of re-nouncing the sometimes-precarious guarantee of abso-lute security." SO? Architecture & Ideas, "House of Chickens". Space. Issue 691, June 2025. p.52-57.

"The House of Chickens is a small, thoughtfully designed structure at Palanga Art and Architecture Farm in eastern Tlirkiye, part of a broader revitalization initiative led by artist Kutlug A ta man. Aimed at restoring a once abandoned rural district, the farm operates on holistic and regenerative agricultural principles, including a large bird rehabilitation area and an ambitious tree-planting campaign. The chicken coop is the first completed building, in a master plan that will include barns, greenhouses, and other agricultural facilities designed by prominent architects. The coop's design centers on creating a humane, climate-adaptive shelter that respects both animals and 1tural environment. Built with timber and simple, low-tech methods, it combines functionality with spatial quality. "(53)

SO? Architecture & Ideas, "IPA Campus—The Pool, The Warehouse". *Space*. Issue 691, June 2025.p.58-63.

"Florya Forest, originally opened in the 1940s, had been partially occupied by district mayors of Istanbul for private residences. Following the 2019 mayoral election, a major transformation was initiated to reclaim the area as a public campus. The private

villas were repurposed into communal workspaces for the Istanbul Planning Agency (IPA), while two abandoned warehouses were converted into multi-purpose public halls. The warehouses' facades and roofs were removed, retaining their steel frames, and a new annex was added to house essential services. The surrounding landscape now serves as an open-air foyer, seamlessly connecting indoor and outdoor spaces for events. (59)

"After decades of unchecked urbanization, a new generation of Chinese architects is turning its attention to the country's rural roots and the potential of its interior regions. Shanghai-based studio Team BLDG, for example, has transformed a nondescript 1990s building in the village of Songzhuang, in the Zhejiang mountains, into a museum of rural arts. Taking their inspiration from traditional regional fabrics, the architects wrapped the building's four volumes in a grid of aluminums tubing." (23)

"The new tofu factory at Songyang-in eastern China-is a collective economic entity, able not only to relaunch its productive activity to meet the new regulations but also to take advantage of that regulatory paradigm shift to promote the local cultural heritage and host other community activities. DnA's design proposes a new public route, an open road in contact with the spaces used for making tofu that also serves as a place for recreation and to stage popular events in close connection with the surrounding landscape, following the natural descent dictated by the course of the river." "Putting together a coherent exhibition in which each piece matched with Scarpa's design would have been a challenge for any gallery owner. The space is anything but a white box: every floor is triangular, every architectural element is stamped with Scarpa's plastic signature, the spaces are bathed in the indomitable light of the water's reflections, and it is forbidden to plant the slightest nail in the protected walls. But Sophie Negropontes has managed to turn these constraints into assets, and it is undoubtedly in this stenographic performance that the gallery owner's art lies." (16)

"Some projects take this intuition even further, conceiving public space not only as a shared ground for interaction, but as a vehicle for political and social emancipation-where children become the benchmark for democratic design. Such is the case in Fresnillo, a project led by architect Rozana Montiel in the district of Zacatecas, located in one of Mexico's most violent states. There, Montiel transformed a former open sewer canal into a multifunctional public space, complete with accessible bridges, rest areas, climbing walls, and amphitheaters." (54)
