SAH NOTICES

1978 Annual Meeting, San Antonio—April 5-10. Adolf K. Placzek, Columbia University, is general chairman of the meeting. O'Neil Ford of Ford, Powell, and Carson will be honorary local chairman, and Mary Carolyn Jutson, San Antonio College, will act as local chairman.

The local committee is planning a full schedule of receptions, special events and tours in conjunction with the meeting. Tours will begin on Saturday afternoon, April 8, and will include a Mission tour and a tour of the King William district, both by bus. (Materials will be available for self-guided tours, also.) On Sunday, April 9, two all-day bus tours will be offered: one to Austin and the other to Fredericksburg. The committee is also planning bus tours for April 9-10: one to Houston-Galveston (overnight in Houston) and the other to Ft. Worth (overnight in Ft. Worth). All who participate in the two-day tours must preregister for them by March 1, 1978.

SAH members will receive the preliminary program, accompanied by preregistration form and hotel reservation card, by December 1, 1977. To insure places on the tours and attendance at functions where numbers are limited, members are urged to preregister promptly.

1979 Annual Meeting, Savannah — April 4-9. David Gebhard, University of California, Santa Barbara, will be general chairman of the meeting. Leopold Adler II and Dean Owens will act as honorary local co-chairmen, and Beth Lattimore Reiter and Holly Symmes Montford will serve as local co-chairmen.

1980 Annual Meeting—Madison, Wisconsin (April 23-27). David Gebhard, University of California, Santa Barbara, will be general chairman of the meeting. University of Wisconsin members Eric S. McCready, Elvehjem Art Center, and Narciso Menocal, Department of Art History, will be local co-chairmen.

1978 Annual Tour—Portland, Maine (and vicinity), August 16-20. Earle G. Shettleworth, Jr., Director of the Maine Historic Preservation Commission, will serve as chairman. The tour will include visits to Wiscasset, Brunswick, Bath, Kennebunk, Kennebunkport, and Cape Arundel.

NEWS OF MEMBERS

DORA WIEBENSON has been selected as the new chairman of the Division of Architectural History at the University of Virginia. WARREN SANDERSON has accepted a new position at Concordia University, Montreal, but he will be spending the next year as a guest lecturer at the University of Trier, West Germany. The restoration of the Philadelphia Academy of Fine Arts, directed by HYMAN MYERS, has received the National Trust for Historic Preservation David E. Finley Award for achievement in preservation. ADA LOUISE HUXTABLE received the Thomas Jefferson Memorial Foundation Medal in Architecture at the Unviersity of Virginia. ERNEST A. CONNALLY, associate director of the Office of Preservation of Historic Properties, National Park Service, has been elected an honorary member of the AIA. And HABS (Historic American Buildings Survey) received the 1977 AIA Medal. The new editor of Interiors is STANLEY ABERCROMBIE. Word has been received of the death of CATHERINE GREEN of Minneapolis, Minn. JAMES MARSTON FITCH has received the Outstanding Achievement in Preservation Award from the New York Chapter of the Victorian Society. BARBARA M. LANE has been awarded a Guggenheim grant for 1977-78, KURT FORSTER returns to Stanford after two years as director of the Swiss Institute in Rome. Before leaving in June he arranged an international colloquium on Palladio.

Conference. "Techniques of Preservation/Case Studies" will be held September 15-16, 1977 at the School of Architecture, University of Virginia, Charlottesville, Virginia 22903.

In Boston, the National Park Service and Boston University have established an innovative program in **urban environmental education** at the Boston National Historic Park, formerly the Charlestown Navy Yard. The Park Service pledged to spend \$2,020,000 by Sept. 30 to rehabilitate the 29-acre park area in the

former Navy Yard and to have a study of Boston's historic buildings prepared by the Society for the Preservation of New England Antiquities. The program in urban environmental education, known as Historic and Urban Environment Studies (HUES), will be conducted in the City of Boston by Boston University's Human Environment Institute, which will develop curriculum, workshops, seminars, tours, and other activities. Programs will be developed for youngsters from the first grade through high school, college students, teachers and interns, government employees, and the general public.

Villas on the Hudson

Compiled by George S. Appleton

One of the most beautiful architectural books ever published in America—now extremely rare in its original edition—*Villas on the Hudson* is of great artistic as well as historical significance. It comprises thirty-one exquisite photolithographs by W. A. Turner, providing a picture of architectural embellishment along the Hudson River, exactly as it appeared in 1860, that cannot be found in any other publication.

The photolithographs capture, in elaborate detail, the grandeur of the residences of William Aspinwall, C. M. Connolly, Thomas Cochran, Samuel Babcock, Washington Irving, and other personages of the nineteenth century.

History of the Skyscraper

by Francisco Mujica

Written by a South American architect who was quite prominent in the early part of this century, this book is the first great pictorial history of what has become virtually the signature of American architecture—the skyscraper. It is a valuable source book of early skyscraper designs, richly embellished with pictures, plans, and perspectives of nearly every tall building built from 1880 to the 1930s.

Both the structural and aesthetic development of the skyscraper are considered in depth; the author traces clearly all the evolutionary transitions in design from nine-teenth-century classical styles to the Gothic tendencies of the early 1920s. The book also includes comments by various architects on the effect of the skyscraper on requirements for adequate sunlight, air circulation, safety, street congestion, and city planning. Controversial views concerning the construction of skyscrapers are well represented by original contributions by John Sloan, Thomas Hastings, Harvey Wiley Corbett, and Henry Curran.

by Erich Mendelsohn

In 1924 Erich Mendelsohn, a leading German architect of the Expressionist period and one of the great figures of modern architecture, visited America for the first time. What he saw and photographed is a fascinating record—America as seen through the eyes of a great European architect.

As can be seen from his photographs, Mendelsohn was deeply impressed and moved by the variety of forms he saw in American cities. From the dramatic spectacles of Times Square and Broadway at night, the majesty of the skyscraper, and the dignity of Chicago's Federal Reserve Bank, to the commonplace factories of the large cities, Mendelsohn captures the spirit of American architecture in the 1920s. Wooden and Brick Buildings with Details

Published under the Direction of A. J. Bicknell

Amos Jackson Bicknell was, in the late nineteenth century, among the most prolific publishers of architectural literature, especially pattern books, and his publications helped to shape architectural tastes in both urban and suburban areas during the post-Civil War era. His Wooden and Brick Buildings with Details, an outstanding example among American architectural pattern books, was the primary source book used by builders and architects of the 1870s. The book contains plans, elevations, views, sections, and details by many of the leading architects of the period, including Samuel Sloan, R. M. Upjohn, Leopold Eidlitz, H. J. Hardenbergh, W. A. Potter, James Renwick, F. C. Withers, and others.



HISTORIC PRESERVATION

Committee on Architectural Preservation. Newsletter Editor Dora Crouch has arranged to carry a series of articles and reports of the activities of this committee and of SAH chapters and individual members in the preservation field over the coming months. Our objective is to develop an on-going framework for communication with the membership in this area, and to provide a forum for conceptual and evaluative discussion of preservation policies and issues which concern us all. The first of the editorials will appear in October, by Hyman Myers who will discuss various aspects of the role of the architect in rehabilitation, particularly as involved in his recently completed and widely acclaimed active re-use and restoration of Frank Furness' (1874) Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts.

SAH Education Committee. Chairman Dora Wiebenson has developed a survey, now being circulated through the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture. Details on the qualifications of those now teaching architectural history in the many new Preservation and American Studies Programs are being solicited. Information being collected by Paul Sprague for the National Trust will provide further information on the role of architectural history in these programs.

Architectural Records. SAH First Vice President Adolf Placzek has been concerned with matters of preservation of architectural records as Avery Librarian, Columbia University, and has been contacted by the National Park Service regarding the Frederick Law Olmsted archives now housed at the Olmsted home and office in Brookline, Massachusetts. These priceless documents were catalogued by Cynthia Zaitzevsky in 1973 under a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

Architectural documentation occurs in unexpected ways. SAH Director William H. Pierson, Jr. (Williams College, *emeritus*), was recently informed that his photographs of the stained glass in **St. Mary's, Burlington, N.J.** (1846-48), one of Richard Upjohn's most important buildings, was the only known record of the glass. The photographs, taken in connection with preparation of Volume II of Doubleday's *American Buildings and Their Architects* series, will be used in restoration of the church after a recent disastrous fire.

College Art Association. A recently formed Preservation Committee of CAA will first meet in September under the chairmanship of Shirley Blum. I have accepted appointment to this committee and will look forward to bringing you information on its activities.

Western New York Chapter. Exciting news comes in on the preservation of Louis Sullivan's famed Guaranty (Prudential) Building (1894), threatened with a \$700,000 foreclosure by the owner. In April Architect John Randall was made manager of the building, and at the suggestion of the local SAH Chapter, Mayor Stanley Makowski declared preservation week June 6th. More than thirty events were scheduled, many run by SAH members, and open house at the building. Despite the 3 million dollars yet to be raised from Federal, State and local sources, Charles Ming, Vice President of United Founders Life Insurance, the owners, has withdrawn demolition applications, convinced of community support.
